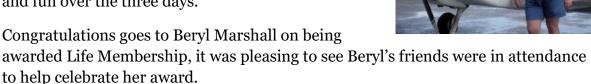

Vale Susie White

We are saddened to advise the membership of the last flight of Susie White, also known as Susie Pink, because of her penchant for all things pink.

Susie was first involved with the Airtourer Association in the early 1990s with, then husband, Doug Stott, and Airtourer 160 VH-CTM. She quickly developed a reputation as the life of any party, and was a regular sight at our fly-ins with her large pink suitcase in the luggage compartment of CTM.



Susie held a commercial licence and was active with the Australian Women Pilots' Association, serving as their President during 2009-2010. Her administrative skills contributed to the success of one of our largest fly-ins, the 21st Convention and AGM at Mildura in 1999. It did help that she worked for the Mayor at the time.

In later years, Susie worked for the Australian Federal Police, primarily in East Timor, which provided her with the opportunity to indulge in her other great passion, scuba diving.

Susie lost her battle with cancer on 24 June 2025, six weeks short of her 68th birthday. She fought it to the end with her signature determination and good humour.



SAAM Victa gets a repaint

South Australian Aviation Museum's Victa 100, VH-BWT, is having a repaint, as the

final stage of its restoration. BWT served with the Royal Aero Club of South Australia until 1975, when it was sold to Chris Sperou. It was withdrawn from use in 1980, and bought a few years later by Trevor Lynch. In 2023, BWT was donated disassembled to the Museum by the Lynch Family, along with the fuselage of sistership VH-BWS.

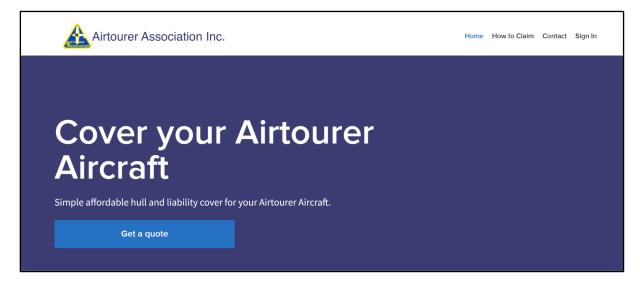

Sunraysia Convention Reports

Escape to Wentworth

The 2025 Airtourer Association Convention and AGM in Wentworth/Mildura from 16-18 May 2025 presented an opportunity to stretch 042's legs following the installation of a substantial avionics update, including the installation of an autopilot, in 2024. [Editor's note: 042 is, of course, Murray's CT-4A, previously A19-042, now VH-LAH.]

The original route planned was YGAS (Gatton Airpark) – YMOR (Moree) – YCBA (Cobar) to YWTO (Wentworth). More detailed planning substituted YNBR (Narrabri) for YMOR due the requirement for a BP carnet at YMOR for Avgas. Comfortable two-hourish sectors for the comfort of the driver, due to tankage limits (driver's, not aircraft)!

I departed from YGAS at 2110z with a reasonable forecast for YNBR and a helpful tailwind at Ao65. W/X during arrival in YNBR was not so pleasant, with rain and some low cloud. After managed a VFR approach (?), I refuelled in the rain before a VFR departure to the south-est. Twenty nautical miles later, the skies cleared nicely for the sector to YCBA. Smooth air and tailwind at Ao85. YCBA to YWTO was also pleasant at Ao85, however I needed a high speed arrival on to runway 26 to squeeze in ahead of Aircruiser MVR, and win the race to the bowser!

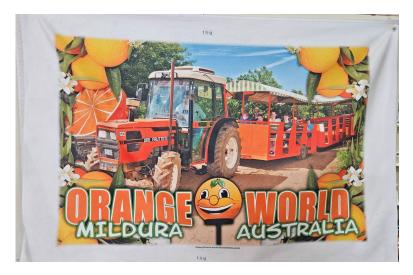
A total of 6.3 flying hours for the day. A long day of flying is exhausting enough, but then there's the refuelling, aircraft securing, and transit from Wentworth to the Mildura Grand accommodation.

Prior history for me in Mildura consisted mostly of rocket arrivals and quick refuels in a former life when the steed at the time (Aermacchi MB326H AKA The Macchischmidt), didn't have sufficient Avtur (motion lotion?) to complete return to YPED (Edinburgh) from the east coast. So I hadn't seen much of Mildura beyond the airport fence. Consequently, I signed up for the Busman's Tour of Mildura and All Points Local on Saturday to view the wider community.

We were again lucky to be chauffeured by [Ed: professional] Stu Hilsberg. A very enjoyable and educational day had by all. Especially noteworthy was the very humorous running narrative from Mario at Orange World. While the bus was touring the district, five aircraft had departed Wentworth for lunch at Pooncarie, via an apparently cryptic navigational challenge. (They all got there, and got back.)

Sunday was notable for the AGM and PPP followed by JOH's recounting of the development of the Aircruiser. The following tarmac walk to illustrate the already explained features of MVR, and how it differed from the Airtourer, was enlightening; less pleasant was the chilly southerly breeze sourced straight from Antarctica and accelerated across a bare tarmac! Comparisons between MVR and LAH (CT-4A) parked adjacent plainly illustrated the CT-4A's parentage. ('Who's Your Daddy?' springs to mind!!).

The only remaining item on the agenda was departure, and while a few aircraft departed from Wentworth on Sunday, I stayed on for an early departure next day.

Monday started by me donning almost any clothing item that promised warmth, necessitated by persistent chilly southerly, then transit by car to YTWO for a

northward departure. Planned route was YTWO – YCBA – YWLG (Walgett) thence direct YGAS. ATD YWTO was 2250z, from runway 17, climb to A075, then A095 looking for an elusive, and unfortunately undiscovered, tailwind. Very cold in the cruise, only partly addressed with the aircraft heater - ensured I kept awake at least!

Quick turnarounds at YCBA and YWLG, helped by convenient straight in approaches on runways 05 at both airports saw me arriving in YGAS at about 0600z. 6.4 flying hours for the day, LAH to bed and a welcome cleansing ale to finish up.

LAH performed well during the trip, and appreciated an extended time in the cruise, evidenced by the light grey tetra ethyl lead deposits on the zorst pipes. I managed to

turn approximately 650 litres of Avgas into noise and fun for the outing there and back. The new avionics, still a bit of a learning curve for me, worked particularly well. The autopilot was a welcome extra set of hands during a navex like this, enabling lunch on the run (Look Ma, no hands!) and an enabled enhanced lookout for any conflicting traffic, without rolling inverted!



Finally – a big vote of thanks to the organisers of the weekend, especially those on the Committee and the faithful transport captains. Bring on Tamworth!!....



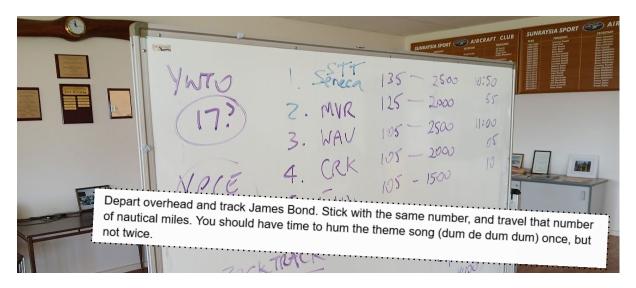
Pooncarie via James Bond?

Uncrewed Airtourer!

A new Victa Airtourer is taking shape in a living room in south-east Queensland. Yes, you read that right. A new Airtourer. Brand new. The aircraft will bear the registration VH-TPY. Yes, you read that right too. But many will know there's already a perfectly airworthy Victa Airtourer 115 TPY that has been on the register since 1963. The new TPY is going to be an exact replica of the original, only it will be one third of the size.

Daniel Wheeler is the builder of this aircraft... this piece of art... this engineering marvel. He probably has around 200 hours of work remaining before the radiocontrolled aircraft can fly, but needs to get that done in time for the Scale Nationals in Bairnsdale in October. If all goes well, Daniel is confident he will qualify for the world championships in Shropshire, UK, in November. Scale ModelWorld 2025



(https://ipmsuk.org/ipms-scale-modelworld/) will feature thousands of models from 190 clubs from around the world.

Daniel is an experienced, third-generation scale modeller, and his specialty is aerobatics. He's been flying remotely since he was five. The class he is entering is F4H, which requires building a scale model less than 14 kg of a currently operational actual aircraft. That means Daniel's model will have a cracked green navigation light, just like the full-size TPY. The number and shape of each rivet will match the original.



The engine will be a two-cylinder Desert Aircraft DA-70 of 70cc. The fuselage is fibreglass, and the wings foam core sheeted with plywood. Apart from the accuracy, the challenge will be to keep the weight under 15 kg. Someone else built a similar aircraft, and it came in at 17 kg, so Daniel's is searching for weight savings everywhere. He is sourcing lighter control servos from China; they have plastic cases rather than



metal. He is using 0.4 mm plywood instead of 0.6 mm. He's using a bladder fuel tank instead of a plastic tank.



Daniel chose the Airtourer because it suits his flying style, and it's aerobatic. The World's will be held on a tarmac runway rather than grass, and a tricycle undercarriage has better authority on take-off and landing. The Airtourer also has good upwind penetration, and presents well in the sky.

I'm sure every Airtourer nut in Australia will be wishing Daniel the very best when he takes on the very best with the very best aircraft design!

Puzzle answer:

The Turbolet pictured is part of the Bangladesh Air Force (BAF) fleet. The connection to the Airtourer family is that the BAF at one time operated three Airtourer T6/24s as basic trainers. In fact, the Airtourer was one of the first aircraft to be operated by the BAF. One of these aircraft (the last Airtourer ever built, c/n B580) is S3-AAK, on display at the Bangladesh Military Museum in Dhaka.

Did that article cause the memories of this old fella to flood back from almost 50 years ago. I remember Mike well and after a rapid promotion to become the Bundy Aero Club CFI the year before, I did his final Nav Test on 30 May 1979.

Before that, going back a couple of years as Mike mentioned, I did some of his RPL training, as per this page from my logbook.

(Given my inexperience, I was fortunate to still be alive at the end of that month after a rather frightening encounter with bad weather on the 2nd. In fact, the same day, someone was not so lucky with the weather, and ran into hills in the "Lane Of Entry" trying to get to Archerfield in a PA-24 VH-GAS).
